GOVERNOR'S EMERGENCY ALERT

Alaska Gov. Mike Dunleavy's office issued an emergency alert on Thursday Nov 12 urging Alaskans to take more precautions to slow the spread of COVID-19. According to the Governor "hospitalizations and sick health care workers are reaching untenable levels...We must act together now, while we still have choices." He asked people to stay 6 feet apart from non-household members, wear masks, and stay 6 feet from others. This will be especially important with the upcoming holiday season. ECONOMIC SUPPORT GRANTS – ROUND 2

The Petersburg Borough Assembly has authorized a second round of small business grants for local businesses who have experienced economic harm due to the Covid-19 public health emergency. Businesses suffering a gross sales decline of 15% or at least \$10,000 during April, May, June of 2020 compared to the same three-month period in 2019 due to the Covid-19 public health emergency are eligible to apply for a grant. Grant awards are based on a percentage of decline in gross sales. This program is limited to for-profit businesses. DEADLINE TO APPLY: 4:30 PM, NOVEMBER 20, 2020

QUESTIONS ABOUT SYMPTOMS OR TEST RESULTS? CALL THE HOTLINE

If you feel sick, stay home. No one wants to put their family, friends, classmates and coworkers at risk. If you have even one symptom of COVID-19 (fever, chills, cough, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle aches, body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion, runny nose, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea), even if it is very mild, should get tested for COVID-19 right away. Tests are most accurate in the first few days of symptoms, and if the test is positive, getting tested right away helps contact tracers move as quickly as possible.
