The flu vaccine helps to protect you and your loved ones from flu and can also reduce the burden on our local hospital.

PLANNING FALL TRAVEL? HELP KEEP COVID OUT OF PETERSBURG

All Alaska residents, including Petersburg residents, arriving in Petersburg from other Alaskan communities are encouraged to:

- Register on the Alaska Travel Portal prior to travel <u>https://www.alaska.covidsecureapp.com</u>
- **Test within 72 hours of arrival in Petersburg.** If pre-travel testing is not possible test upon arrival at the airport. Alaska residents test for free.
- o Self isolate until negative test results are received:
 - Wear face coverings when inside stores and shops or around others where social distancing

is not possible

- Wash hands frequently and utilized hand sanitizer when available
- Maintain a 6' distance from others as much as possible
- Keep social groups small and avoid large crowds
- Keep track of your contacts until knowledge of a negative test is known

NOTE: These guidelines are only for Alaskans traveling from within the state to Petersburg. All travelers arriving from outside of Alaska are subject to the stricter State of Alaska Health Mandate 10 testing requirements and protocols. FREE COVID TESTING, NO SYMPTOMS REQUIRED

The SouthEast Alaska Regional Health Consortium (SEARHC) encourages Petersburg residents to stay safe and get tested for COVID-19.

When: Every Saturday & Sunday Hours: 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. Where: SEARHC Parking Lot, 202 Gjoa Street

WHAT TO DO AFTER YOUR TEST

The days following getting tested are crucially important. If you are being tested because of symptoms or a close contact:

- Stay at home until your test results are back (except to get medical care).
- Avoid all public places and transportation.
- Keep at least 6 feet from people and animals, including those in your household.
- Avoid sharing personal household items, wash your hands and high touch surfaces regularly.
- Inform your work (or your child's school) that you are awaiting results.
- Keep track of your contacts

QUESTIONS ABOUT SYMPTOMS OR TEST RESULTS? CALL THE HOTLINE

If you feel sick, stay home. No one wants to put their family, friends, classmates and coworkers at risk. If you have even one symptom of COVID-19 (fever, chills, cough, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle aches, body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion, runny nose, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea), even if it is very mild, should get tested for COVID-19 right away. Tests are most accurate in the first few days of symptoms, and if the test is positive, getting tested right away helps contact tracers move as quickly as possible.
