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# Executive Summary



# Status of Our Audit

We have completed our audit of the financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 2023. Our audit was conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. This audit of the financial statements does not relieve management or Borough Assembly of their responsibilities.

- The objective of our audit was to obtain reasonable not absolute assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.
- The scope of the work performed was substantially the same as that described to you in our earlier Audit Planning communications.
- ▶ We have issued an unmodified opinion(s) on the financial statements and release our report on January 26, 2024.
- ▶ We have issued an unmodified opinion on the Borough's Single Audit report, including the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA), and Schedule of State Financial Assistance (SSFA).
- ▶ We issued our report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters based on an audit of financial statements performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards.
- ▶ In planning and performing our audit of the SEFA and SSFA, we considered the Borough's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on its major federal and state programs to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with GAS and Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance), and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance.
- Our responsibility for other information in documents containing the Borough's audited financial statements does not extend beyond the financial information identified in the audit report, and we are not required to perform procedures to corroborate such other information. However, in accordance with professional standards, we have read the information included by the Borough and considered whether such information, or the manner of its presentation, was materially inconsistent with its presentation in the financial statements. Our responsibility also includes calling to management's attention any information that we believe is a material misstatement of fact. We have not identified any material inconsistencies or concluded there are any material misstatements of facts in the other information that management has chosen not to correct.
- ▶ All records and information requested by BDO were freely available for our inspection.
- Management's cooperation was excellent. We received full access to all information that we requested while performing our audit, and we acknowledge the full cooperation extended to us by all levels of Borough personnel throughout the course of our work.





### Results of the Audit

#### ACCOUNTING PRACTICES, POLICIES, ESTIMATES

The following summarizes the more significant required communications related to our audit concerning the Borough's accounting practices, policies, estimates:

The Borough's significant accounting practices and policies are those included in Note 1 to the financial statements. These accounting practices and policies are appropriate, comply with generally accepted accounting principles and industry practice, were consistently applied, and are adequately described within Note 1 to the financial statements.

- A summary of recently issued accounting pronouncements is included in Note 15 to the Borough's financial statements.
- ▶ There were no other changes in significant accounting policies and practices during FY23.
- ▶ The Borough adopted GASB Statement No. 96 Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements - Effective for the year-ended June 30, 2023. This statement addresses accounting and financial reporting for subscription-based information technology arrangements (SBITAs) for government end users. The Borough did discovery of all active leases and used materiality policies to determine whether they applied to GASB 96, and determined that this standard did not have a significant impact on the Boroughs operations.

Significant estimates are those that require management's most difficult, subjective, or complex judgments, often as a result of the need to make estimates about the effects of matters that are inherently uncertain. Petersburg's significant accounting estimates, including a description of management's processes and significant assumptions used in development of the estimates, are disclosed in Note 1 of the financial statements. We do not consider any of these estimates to be significant.



#### CORRECTED AND UNCORRECTED MISSTATEMENTS

Please refer to the schedule of uncorrected misstatements. We concur with management's assessment that the effects of not recording such adjustments are, both individually and in the aggregate, immaterial to the consolidated financial statements taken as a whole, considering both qualitative and quantitative factors. None of the proposed adjustments could potentially cause future-period financial statement to be materially misstated.





### **Group Audit**

As you are aware, the audit of the Borough requires the inclusion of financial information for all components of the reporting entity. The reporting entity is comprised of the Borough and its "component units" as defined by GAAP. This collection of individual reporting entities comprises the "Group." Our audit is considered the "Group" Audit.

Included in the Borough's audit are the audits of Petersburg City School District and Petersburg Medical Center. The audit of Petersburg City School District was performed by BDO USA, LLP. The audit of Petersburg Medical Center was performed by another firm. Where relevant, we have included information in this report as it relates to Petersburg City School District and Petersburg Medical Center.



# Internal Control Over Financial Reporting



### Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Borough's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion(s) on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Borough's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Borough's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses.

We are required to communicate, in writing, to Borough Assembly all material weaknesses and significant deficiencies that have been identified in the Borough's internal control over financial reporting. The definitions of control deficiency, significant deficiency and material weakness follow:

Category	Definition
Control Deficiency	A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis.
Significant Deficiency	A deficiency or combination of deficiencies in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by Borough Assembly.
Material Weakness	A deficiency or combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Borough 's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

In conjunction with our audit of the financial statements, we noted no material weaknesses.

Landfill Liability

Review of landfill liability was not performed timely during FY23.

<u>Segregation of duties related to ACH Payments and Wire Transfers</u> Finance Director can initiate and approve their own ACH & wire transfers.

Segregation of Duties related to IT System Access

The Finance Director has administrative access to the financial accounting system, and all users have the ability to enter/post/approve their own journal entries.

<u>Segregation of Duties Related to Check Signing Authority</u> The Finance Director has the authority to sign checks on the Borough's behalf, and has

physical access to check stock.

<u>Amortization of Bond Premiums & Deferred Charges</u> Borough controls did not identify errors in the amortization of premiums and deferred charges related to outstanding bonds.

<u>Allowance for Doubtful Accounts & Bad Debt Expense</u> Borough controls did not properly identify reconciliation errors between the trial balance and the bad debt expense and allowance for doubtful accounts. BDO USA, P.C. January 26, 2024 Page 4 of 10

- (9) We acknowledge our responsibility for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control to prevent and detect fraud or noncompliance.   - Deferred compensation, bonuses, pensions plans, or severance pay; or

- (14) The Government has satisfactory title to all owned assets, and there are no liens or encumbrances on such assets nor has any asset been pledged as collateral.
- (15) We have appropriately disclosed the Government's policy regarding whether to first apply restricted or unrestricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position are available and have determined that net position is properly recognized under the policy.
- (16) We have complied with all aspects of contractual agreements, including debt covenants, that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance. We have also complied with the SEC disclosure rules for reporting annual financial information and material events to repositories in accordance with SEC Rule N.240, 15c2-12.
- (17) No discussions have taken place with your firm's personnel regarding employment with the Government.
- (18) We are responsible for compliance with laws, regulations and provisions of contracts and grant agreements applicable to us and we have identified and disclosed to you all laws, regulations and provisions of contracts and grant agreements that we believe have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts.
- (19) Components of net position (net investment in capital assets, restricted and unrestricted) and classifications of fund balance (nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned and unassigned) are properly classified and, if applicable, approved.
- (20) Revenues are appropriately classified in the statement of activities within program revenues, contributions, and general revenues. Expenses have been appropriately classified in or allocated to functions and programs in the statement of activities, and allocations have been made on a reasonable basis.
- (21) In regards to assistance that was provided in preparation of the financial statements and related footnote disclosures for the year ended June 30, 2023, as well as the assistance provided in preparation and submission of the required Form SF-SAC Data Collection Form and GASB 68 and 75 entries performed by you, we have: (1) assumed all management responsibilities, (2) designated an individual (within senior management) with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience to oversee the services, (3) evaluated the adequacy and results of the services performed, and (4) accepted responsibility for the results of the services.

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- (22) We acknowledge our responsibility for presenting the supplementary information in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United State of America and we believe it is fairly presented. The methods of measurement and presentation of the supplementary information have not changed from the prior period and we have disclosed to you any significant assumptions underlying the measurement and presentation of the supplementary information.
- (23) Required supplementary information is measured and presented in accordance with prescribed guidelines.
- (24) With respect to federal award programs:
  - (a) We are responsible for understanding and complying with, and have complied with, the requirements of Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal and state Regulations* (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal and state Awards* (Uniform Guidance), including requirements relating to the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards (SEFA).
  - (b) We have, in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, identified and disclosed to you in the schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards (SEFA), expenditures made during the audit period for all government programs and related activities provided by federal agencies in the form of federal awards, grants, federal cost-reimbursement contracts, loans, loan guarantees, property (including donated surplus property), cooperative agreements, interest subsidies, insurance, food commodities, direct appropriations, and other direct assistance.
